Commercial trade of electrical power, natural gas, crude oil and gasoline has taken place between these countries for decades. Today, both parties rely on the continuation of this trade.

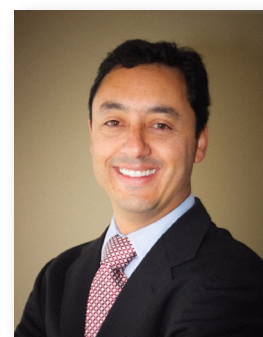
Biography
